

Greetings Watchung Residents,

At this writing the town is still performing some pretty significant clean-up work following the recent and devastating Riley and Quinn storms. Having traveled most of Watchung's streets in the last week, I have never personally seen so many downed trees, poles, and wires in Watchung at one time. And while there are process improvements to be made, from my perspective overall I was very impressed with the coordination of activities across a multitude of organizations, including Office of Emergency Management (OEM), CERT, DPW, Police, Fire, Rescue, PSE&G, JCP&L, our tree contractors, and our Mayor and Council. The team work and communication was excellent, allowing us to work together with the residents to get things restored. Each street's needs were different, and sometimes the situations were complex. As I expressed to many residents, we have appreciated your patience.

The Affordable Housing issue affecting every municipality throughout the State has been a top concern of your governing body in Watchung for years. It is part of a NJ State Supreme Court mandate, in effect now for 40 years. As defendants in this affordable housing litigation against the plaintiff, Fair Share Housing Center, your Mayor, Council, and Administration have spent many recent months revisiting all options in hopes of achieving a compromise settlement response. While understandably there are many residents in town, as in other towns, who are resistant to this change, make no mistake to think that this issue can or will go away; it is a reality whose impact we are working within the legal system to minimize. We are hopeful for a settlement in the near future.

Having shopped at Sears for over 40 years, I was saddened by the closing and now very recent tear-down of the Sears property and related Sears Auto Center, on Route 22. Sears for decades was the source of many appliances, lawn mowers, and numerous Craftsman tools in the Pote family! I am, however, pleased to report that the Planning Board has meticulously been working with Seritage Growth Properties who purchased the Sears properties; the Board has reviewed, commented on, and approved detailed plans to build 5 new retail stores and 4 pad sites where the Sears building was. Across Terrill Road, where the Sears Auto Center was, now becomes the future site of a recently Board-approved 10 movie cinema complex, a state-of-the-art movie theater.

Our Planning Board also has reached an agreement with Weldon Materials, in regards to a major reforestation of parts of Bonnie Burn Road, especially where the closed Colorado Café building will be removed. Relating to other activities, long-needed renovations to the Borough Fire Department building are close to completion. We also have completed the shortened deer-culling season, having removed 41 deer with 44 fetuses. We will continue to be proactive this year, reviewing any recently revised rules and regulations as it relates to deer management; but I will push, as needed, to resume the original amount of weeks as is allowed by the New Jersey Division of Fish and Wildlife.

I continue to voice a different opinion with some Council members who at this time are now discussing the possibility of closing down the Watchung Library. Shared services with Warren would mean that Watchung annually will still pay an \$800k County Library Tax, but would no longer have a physical library of our own. As I have stated for years, to enhance the lives of our residents and build a greater sense of community in our town, a strong library (technology and resource community center) presence consistent with the means and needs of Watchung should be built. A library is still a basic service, but a state-of-the-art library provides an incredible potential investment return to all of its residents, which I always have maintained far outweighs its cost (average cost ~\$85 annually; potentially averaging ~\$40 annually after government matching).

The course includes the following topics: Disaster Preparedness, Disaster Fire Suppression, Disaster Medical Operations, Light Search and Rescue Operations, Disaster Psychology & Team Organization, Terrorism and a Final Exercise. The training is held at the Somerset County Training Academy, Hillsborough, NJ.

The Watchung Historical Committee is happy to report that the “Legend of Watchung” Mural was safely removed from the Sears Building in September 2017 by Materials Conservation, and is currently being stored in a climate controlled facility. About \$15,000 has already been raised through a Go-Fund-Me page and other fundraising activities, most of which has been used for this safe removal and storage of the Mural.

Approximately \$25,000 more is needed for the cleaning, restoration and re-installation of the Mural. We are consulting other professionals for additional estimates in hopes of reducing this cost. *No tax payer money is being used for this effort*, and we are relying solely on private donations. We applied for, and received, a \$4000 grant from The Somerset County Cultural and Heritage Commission which will help. We are still seeking donations, large or small to help assure that our wonderful Mural is restored and finds a new home. While the Mural’s new home is yet to be determined, we are looking at different locations which will be public and well visited. **We are open to ideas from the public!** We plan to have a decision by September of this year.

If you have not seen our WW I exhibit featuring the famous posters and two other newly acquired items, plan to visit soon! 2017 was the 100th anniversary of the USA engaging in the war and exhibits were state wide. Our video project, “Reflections of Watchung” is close to completion and we hope to have a “movie night” soon so that you can all see what we are doing to preserve what life was like in the early days of Watchung. We recently received some priceless film of Camp Endeavor from the 1940’s which will be incorporated. We also made sure to obtain some artifacts from the Colorado Café. Please visit your museum!

Two Revolutionary War grave s were identified and specially marked in “God’s Little Acre,” as a result of an Eagle Scout project. We plan to have a program in the spring about this project. A Girl Scout Gold Award has also been completed and look for publicity about this soon. This project includes historic walking and driving tours of Watchung.

The Texier House is now freshly painted and the overgrown shrubbery was removed. The Museum is now another jewel on the circle! The Texier Museum is open the first and third Sundays of each month from 2:00 PM – 4:00 PM and by appointment any time. We have vacancies on the Committee. Please contact me if you are interested in working on the Historical Committee and helping us preserve and protect the history of Watchung.

We realize that it is hard to imagine now, but spring is on its way and summer will soon follow. That means an increase in outdoor activities, including the use of residential pools. Pools can be a source of disease, injury, and death. In fact, according to the Federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, **drowning is the leading cause of unintentional injury death among children aged 1 – 4 years and most of these drownings occur in residential pools.** In recognition of these facts, the Middle-Brook Regional Health Commission has developed a voluntary residential pool inspection program and we encourage all property owners with pools to participate. The program includes an informational flier and an onsite visit where an experienced environmental health professional will review your pool and operations and provide suggestions, where appropriate, for improving the health and safety of your pool experience. If everything goes according to plan the warm weather will soon return, flowers will bloom, the fountains in the lakes will be turned on, and the latest crime statistics for New Jersey will be published. As sure as all of the others things will happen, you can bet that Watchung will have one of the highest crime rates in New Jersey having been recently ranked as high as 13th in the state. How can this be? you may ask. What about all of those people fishing and walking around Watchung Lake with the fountains spraying and water gently cascading over the spillway? Are all of those people in danger? How can both of those things exist simultaneously in the same place? They do in fact exist simultaneously because crime rates are based on index crimes and population.

The crime rate is based on the number of index crimes reported per 1,000 residents. Index crimes include crimes such as homicide, robbery, aggravated assault, arson, and burglary, but the crime that puts Watchung high on the list is theft. According to the latest Uniform Crime Report there were 370 index crimes reported in Watchung (2015). These crimes are considered non-violent, and the overwhelming majority of them in Watchung are shoplifting offenses. With 370 index crimes reported, and roughly 6,000 residents, that gives us a crime rate of 62, or 62 crimes for every 1,000 residents. If you only look at how high Watchung is on that list without knowing a little more about how we got there, you could be easily misled when you see that our crime rate is higher than Newark's. A closer look will tell you that of those 370 index crimes, 352 were thefts, and of those 352 thefts, 286 were shoplifting offenses.

From our experience we know that some people shoplift out of want, some people shoplift out of need, and some do it just for the thrill. Still others are part of a more elaborate and organized criminal element, but sadly most people are shoplifting to support a drug addiction. The opioid and heroin epidemic affecting our society has been well documented, and the area we live in is certainly not immune. In many ways Watchung is a typical New Jersey small town, but what is not typical for a community of our size is the amount of retail shopping space that we have along RT 22. When you also factor in a significant amount of shoplifting that is fueled by an opioid and heroin epidemic, what you end up with is a community with a high crime rate that just does not seem to match its bucolic setting.

There are many factors that go into overall crime rates, so don't fall into the trap of only looking at the bottom line. Shoplifting accounts for most of our crime here in Watchung, and only seven of the 370 index crimes reported in 2015 fall into the "violent" category. Our crime rate is high, and we will continue to work closely with retail establishments to bring those numbers down, but I would argue that our community is safe in spite of our crime rate. Spring is in the air!

As Spring approaches many of us begin to think about our gardens, lawns, and landscaping. Well-groomed properties are a delight; yet, rarely do we stop to think about the cost - the price we pay for that beauty. No, not the money we spend, but the cost to nature, the cost to the environment we live in.

The following facts, statements and pointers are to encourage you to think twice about your gardening habits and, perhaps, how you may alter them a bit to help preserve the natural beauty that surrounds us here in Watchung.

First about the bees...

There are an enormous variety of bees, unfortunately they are often misunderstood. The younger generation of today will become tomorrow's conservationists. Let's educate them now so they may understand the benefits of the many pollinators. A simple start is to teach them that most bees rarely sting unless provoked.

FACT: Most insect species are beneficial or harmless

The bumblebee has recently been put on the endangered species list. Did you know bumblebees are not aggressive and their nests only last a season? If you find a bumblebee nest, please leave it alone.

Honeybees and bumblebees love clover! It's a wonderful feeding ground for them as well as dandelions. To some, dandelions may be an annoyance as they rapidly spread across our lawns. Unfortunately, they last between 8-15 weeks from seedling stage to full grown flower. Please think twice before you spray them. Garden pesticides and lawn care products contain **neonicotinoids**. These chemicals are not good for humans nor wildlife. They can remain in the soil for years and continue to be taken up by the plants, bees, insects, birds and animals, including your outdoor pets. While their involvement in colony collapse disorder is a charged debate, a question remains. Could these neonicotinoids have a seriously negative effect further up the food chain?

Have you ever seen neat circular shapes cut from the leaves on your plants? They look like a big bite was taking out of the leaf. Those are made by Leafcutter bees. Believe it or not it won't harm the plant so please don't spray the plants with pesticides.

Please think of your garden as a feeding station and safe haven for bees, birds, butterflies and other wildlife.

Let's not forget about the birds which are also in decline in some areas. Many of the studies suggest that the birds and bees may share a common enemy - pesticides. The birds may risk exposure by flying near an area being sprayed, eating seeds that may be covered with pesticides or become toxic by eating pesticide laced insects although there does not seem to be enough evidence to support this theory.

Additionally, the fertilizers and pesticides can easily be spread on a breezy day and drift into our lakes and streams ultimately affecting the wildlife.

Of course these are not the sole reasons our wildlife are at risk so hopefully, you will consider alternatives to lessen the harm we pose to these amazing creatures.

Fact: Bees pollinate a significant majority of the world's food - unfortunately these essential pollinators are in serious trouble.

Some basic guidelines:

Protect birds, bees and other insects from pesticides.

Provide a variety of food for bees. Consider plantings with staggered bloom times. Learn about the native plants in your area.

Provide shelter for bees. Wild bees will nest in undisturbed and untilled ground as well as some dead trees and plants.

Fact: 1 out of every 3 bites of food we eat is pollinated by bees.

Clean Water NJ

In The Home

- Shop for nonhazardous, biodegradable and phosphorous-free household cleaning products.
- If you use water-based paints, rinse paint brushes in the sink. If you use oil-based paints, you can filter and reuse the thinner used to clean brushes. Dispose of thinner through a local household hazardous waste program. Visit www.state.nj.us/dep/dshw/rtrp/hhwcps.htm for a list of local household hazardous waste facilities.
- Sweep up dirt and debris and discard on your lawn or in the trash. Hosing off pavement washes pollutants into storm drains, which may lead to local creeks, bays and the ocean.
- Rather than wash your car in your driveway, on the street or in your yard, take it to a local car wash. This not only conserves water but also eliminates the running off of harmful pollutants.
- Keep trash cans closed to prevent trash from scattering.
- If you use hazardous substances such as paints, solvents and cleaners, use them sparingly, according to the directions. Store properly to avoid spills.
- If you are working on a home improvement project, dispose of drywall and hardened concrete and mortar in the trash or visit www.nj.gov/dep/dshw/lrm/classb.htm for a list of recycling centers. Do not rinse concrete or mortar from a bucket or wheelbarrow into the street; dilute the mixture with water and rinse it into an area with vegetation or gravel.
- Participate in local recycling programs. To find out more about recycling in your area, visit www.state.nj.us/dep/dshw/recycling/index.htm.
- Dispose of unwanted chemicals at a household hazardous waste collection center in your area. Never pour hazardous materials into the street, sewer or the storm drain. For more information, visit www.state.nj.us/dep/dshw/rtrp/hhwcps.htm.
- Eliminate or, at least, reduce the use of soaps and shampoos when using outdoor showers that drain to the street.



Litter & Recycling Tips

- Reduce, reuse and recycle materials whenever possible to create less waste, which could end up on our streets and contribute to stormwater pollution.
- Pick up trash and litter on your property and put it in the trash. Always use a public trash can for trash in public areas. Recycle any reusable materials, especially cans, bottles and paper. NEVER throw litter and debris directly into storm drains. Such debris can wash into waterways and onto beaches, and clogged drains can cause street flooding and traffic congestion.
- Always put your cigarette butts in ashtrays or solid garbage cans, not on the streets. Remember, our parks, playgrounds and beaches are not ashtrays. When an ashtray or garbage can are not available, store extinguished butts in your cigarette pack until you find a proper receptacle.
- Empty automobile ashtrays into the trash, not out your car window or directly on the ground. Proper disposal will help keep our waterways clean and minimize the risk of fires.
- Make sure to properly dispose of leftover household chemicals, paints and automotive fluids. These leftover chemicals should never be thrown away.
